## Nominations are now being accepted for the following NMLA Awards:

**Community Achievement Award** – this award is given to librarians (those certified or with a degree) for outstanding library service or achievement at the local level. Also, may be given as NMLA's recognition of an award from another source that has enhanced the library, and to the entire library community; thus, to a local, school, or academic librarian who has received a community, regional, or national honor.

**Honorary Life Membership Award** – NMLA's highest award is given to individuals for outstanding contributions to the purposes of NMLA, for constructive accomplishment rather than longevity, not limited to librarians, may be given to anyone for helping NMLA and/or libraries in New Mexico. Criteria: Significant contribution to NMLA and its activities throughout the library career. Scope of activity beyond own work location; achievements and contributions to NMLA growth are known within the library community, as well as being recognized by other persons or entities in New Mexico.

**Legislator of the Year Award** – given to a New Mexico state legislator who has demonstrated leadership in the advancement of libraries throughout the state. Criteria: Notable legislative contribution to library funding, the issues of intellectual freedom, and/or access to library services.

**New Mexico Library Amigo Award** – given to an individual (friend, volunteer, trustee, board member, other citizen, or other non-certified personnel) whose work on behalf of the local library has resulted in significant progress and/or achievement for that library; or in recognition of work in the promotion of library service within the state.

**New Mexico Library Leadership Award** – given to librarians who have rendered outstanding service beyond the local community. Criteria: Notable contribution to the advancement of libraries within the state, known and recognized in more than one community. Contributions of a nature that bring recognition and/or enhance the image of libraries in general within New Mexico. Activities and efforts that have helped other librarians to improve their service capabilities.

These awards will be presented at the in-person 2022 NMLA Annual Conference scheduled for October 26-28 in Albuquerque.

## Intellectual Freedom From a Shifting Landscape by Valerie Nye




Intellectual Freedom from a Shifting Landscape is a book I edited and published with ALA (2020). Editing, designing, and making decisions about the book's content was made possible with support and an exchange of ideas that included many New Mexico librarians. The book is a collection of stories written by twenty librarians from academic, school, public, and special libraries.

The stories in this book provide encouragement to librarians who are facing challenges and provide evidence that creating proper policy prior to a challenge will help guide the actions that need to occur when a challenge is launched. The stories will also provide an opportunity to generate creative ideas for supporting social justice issues that impact each library's community. The librarians who share their experiences provide real-world examples that can be a rich source of discussion for library staff, boards, and with community members. Conversations about intellectual freedom can


be guided by the questions at the end of each chapter to help illuminate the local issues relevant to the shared scenarios.

Stories in the book include a chapter from librarians at the Denver Public Library describing their innovative Social Justice Book Club, an experience from librarians at the University of Wisconsin-Madison about welcoming Black Lives Matter demonstrations, a very personal essay from a librarian about hosting a drag queen story time, and a story about a librarian who turned a canceled author visit into an opportunity to have a series of difficult conversations with her community.



## Summer Food Drive Success

Rio Rancho Public Libraries hosted a food drive to assist the community during the summer when kids are out of school and donations are needed. We partnered with a local food bank, St Felix Pantry, and accepted donations from June 6 through July 1, 2022 at both library locations.

Our theme was "Dive into Giving" to go along with the summer reading program theme of "Oceans of Possibilities." Each library decorated a container for the food donations. St Felix Pantry picked up the food on a couple of occasions; one pickup resulted in 113 pounds, which was over 135 meals. We were thrilled to do the food drive, and St Felix Pantry appreciated the donations.
